Nga korero o te tumuaki

Everyone always begins a school year with great expectations – that they will do better than they did the year before or that they will be successful at something new. I on the other hand always end the year with great expectations – that we will have cracked it with external assessments and do better than we did last year. So it is with great pride I congratulate **Thomas Seear-Budd** for his wonderful achievement of being named Top Scholar for New Zealand in Graphics with an outstanding scholarship graphics result (also scholarship in Geography) and **Felix Barber** on his four scholarships. We gained fourteen scholarships - well done **Michael Boyes, Lucy Beeler, Freya Dean, Keir Leslie, Grace Thomas, James Titchener** and **Zachary Kerr**.

Well done **Melby Ruarus** too. Melby is keeping up a fine Wellington High tradition: being chosen to represent New Zealand in the secondary schools' Informatics Olympiad team to compete in Bulgaria later in the year. In three of the four years New Zealand has selected a team High has had a team member. Information Science is a real strength at High and Vince Brannigan is to be congratulated for enabling students to develop their skills in this way.

Over the last couple of months we have been reviewing all the information and results from last year. This review always informs the decisions we make and is the catalyst for many of the changes we make, and we do make changes. We change to meet student and curriculum demands and to improve our service. That means that the last child in a family may well have different reports, different subjects to choose from, different tests and exams, different roopu times and different standards assessed in the same course. So please do not assume because one child did something that the later ones' experience at High will be identical – we try to ensure it will be improved. This newsletter is one of the ways we tell people of changes and seek feedback. We try to tell people when it is relevant and close to the time of the change so they remember. To test our performance and see whether caregivers are happy at the end of last year we sent out a written survey, after two years of random phone surveys. Ninety three, 9%, of caregivers replied and there were some clear messages: school fees should not be raised, newsletters are informative, are often enough and should not be just emailed, staff can at times be more helpful but they are welcoming and friendly, there could be more homework, most thought their students were learning at an appropriate rate and were being assisted with learning difficulties, some thought their students needed more extension though more were happy with extension opportunities than the last survey in 2005. 37% of caregivers expressed some dissatisfaction

with the information they could get from reports. 48 caregivers offered written comments. They ranged from highly approving – the school is proactive, offering great education for today's generation, teachers helpful, to highly critical - I found the school slack, my son was bored, failed to provide boundaries for my son. Some caregivers identified themselves and I have followed most up and had some very fruitful conversations.

If things are not as you would like, come and talk, do not wait until the end of the year. If you find us unresponsive, please get in touch with me. I will ensure we will do our best to meet the learning needs of your student. If that does not work the Board of Trustees are very willing to listen to you and challenge us to meet your needs.

Reader Writers needed

We have students with specific learning needs which prevent them either reading or writing quickly enough to meet the time demands of internal and external assessments. Those who are just 'slow at processing' may be enrolled in fewer papers and do not necessarily qualify for special examination conditions. Students whose learning disposition is such that engagement in class lessons and home-based preparation is consistently inadequate have been found to gain little benefit from a reader writer.

However when students do qualify they are entitled to share their understanding through a reader and or writer. We need volunteers to be readers and writers. The ideal person is a patient person with one or two hours spare on different days of the week. Ideally one person would build up a relationship with a single student and be at their assessments. But we will accept offers from people who can only do it occasionally or just at school or national examinations. Parents: your mother or father may be just the ideal person. Drugs – Marijuana and Attendance

We have already suspended eight students for drug offences this year and it can not continue. There is no doubt that marijuana adversely affects adolescents' ability to learn and that stoned students have a very depressing effect on the classes in which they sit like stones. Sometimes other students know they are stoned and it affects their learning too.

We are being very vigilant and if we suspect even a slight association with drugs we will ring and tell you of our suspicions. The Board has instructed me to suspend students based on these suspicions. So talk to your student especially if they are a regular party goer.

Often poor attendance, drop in achievement and drug taking go hand in and wagging is our first indicator. Our electronic checking and new text notification system is working much better than in the past and we are tracking attendance effectively. If your students are over 16 and regular truants you can expect us to be asking: *Why are you here? Go and find a course or get a job!*

We need people here, at school, who are here to work, not bored slackers who we spend hours chasing and checking their attendance, at the expense of students who want to learn.

Let's work together to keep our school drug free.

Reports

Over the last six months we have reviewed our reporting and we have made some changes. While we will never go back to a mark out of 100 or merely an A, B, C or D with which most of you are familiar, we are aiming to ensure reports help you set real learning goals with your student.

We have looked at the timing of written reports and of the personal learning objective interviews held in the junior school. We are changing the timing of the annual full written report for juniors. It will be issued at the end of term 3 followed by a parent report evening in the first week of term 4. We are doing this so that junior students can make an informed choice for their next year's courses. We have also listened to the desire of parents of junior students to see each subject teacher, even though the tukutahi programme we are developing in the junior school seeks to concentrate on developing the key competencies and learning dispositions of the new curriculum. We have provided for this.

Very Important Notices for all Parent/Caregivers

Personalised Learning Objective meetings (Term 2/4 for year 9 & 10 students):

In preparation for the PLO interview with your student's roopu teacher, you will be given a selection of data that we have collected including:

1. Results of Progressive Achievement Tests (PATs) and AsTTle tests
2. Attendance and pastoral information
3. Individual subject credit sheets from term 1
4. A paragraph of student reflection

The meeting will take place at an allocated time on Wednesday 27 May between you, your student and your student's roopu teacher. In the meeting we will be discussing the data that has been collected, viewing some student work samples and setting goals for the remainder of the year.

The meeting in November will look at how your student has progressed towards these goals and what needs to be the focus for the following year.

Moodle

Moodle is the Learning Management System (LMS) of Wellington High School at <http://moodle.whs.school.nz/> and is a work in progress.

When you visit the home page you will notice a block called Course Categories on the left hand side of the page. This divides the site into 3 areas: staff, students, community. The majority of courses that students take have a moodle page and can only be accessed by student log in except where guest access is allowed (either with or without a key). Check with your student's teachers to see if there is a key.

In the community section there are 3 pages at present: Careers, NCEA, Guidance and Counselling – follow the links and log in as a guest if you are interested in any of these areas. More will be added – watch this space!

Internal Assessment Calendar on moodle:

Dates of internal assessments are contained on the calendar (on the right hand side when you go to <http://moodle.whs.school.nz/>) Hold the cursor on the day and a list of the day's assessments will drop down. Check with your student if they have any of these assessments. A list of course codes can be found below the calendar eg Year 12 Advanced Mathematics is ADM223.

Not Achieved for Internal Assessments

To improve your ability to be able to monitor your child's NCEA progress, from the start of term 2 you will receive a letter if your child has not achieved an internally assessed standard. In addition we will continue to send you results at the end of each term of internally assessed standards that have been assessed.

If you are worried about an assessment you know your student has sat please feel free to email the teacher.


STAFFING

BOARD NEWS

Board of Trustees meetings are held in the Staffroom usually on the last Monday of every month. Staff and interested parent/caregivers are welcome to attend. Meetings are held in the staffroom and start at 6.00pm. Any issues may be raised through the staff representative or Board member. The next Board of Trustees meeting will be held on 4 May 2009.

All of you will have received invoices for 2009 and we would like to explain the reasons for the assistance we request.



Firstly, we would like you to know that for the first time in many years we are budgeting for a deficit. We have cut some costs and will be doing all we can next year to turn this around.

The Operations Grant we receive from the Government only covers basic costs. For us to continue to be able to provide the most up to date teaching using modern technology we rely on locally raised funds, of which your payments are a significant part. If we received a 5% increase in the amount of fees we collect, this would make a significant impact on the finances of the school.

Course Fees

These are fees for which there is a take home component, workbook or a field trip. These fees must be paid unless you apply to the Principal and receive a waiver.

School activities donation (\$150) for one student, \$220 for a family

This pays for the many things the school provides that we cannot afford from government funding: eg some sports gear, school magazine, first aid, extra library books and magazines, the café, minibus, musical instruments, and some teacher aides.

Technology levy (\$100)

To ensure we maintain our edge in information technology by providing computers, digital cameras, camcorders and projectors so that teachers and students can use modern learning technologies. All students get an internet account that permits them a year's research and \$5 for printing.

Building levy (\$50)

To date this levy has been used to help refurbish the science labs, toilets, classrooms and plan a new gym. We ask you to pay these fees and levies so that we can maintain a high standard of resources for your students. This year we will begin building a second gym, another hospitality kitchen and a new fashion room. We have no other school wide-fundraising activities.

All donations are tax deductible in the year that they are paid.

Debating is well underway this year with 5 teams involving students from Yrs 9 to 13. Congratulations especially to the Junior Certificate team who won their first ever debate.



SOME STUDY HINTS

Some subjects may give you specific homework that has deadlines. Use your School Diary to record this. In other subjects you may have long term projects or portfolios that you are working on or it may be useful to read over your class notes.

The reason for setting homework is to give students the opportunity to work on their own without supervision or help, and to reinforce class learning.

Things you should do if you want to improve your learning:

1. Try to have a special quiet place in which to work and always work there.
2. See that you have good facilities such as a desk or suitable table, good lighting, warmth and quiet conditions.

Things you should NOT do:

- Don't fool yourself that you work better with the radio on, or in front of the TV. You WON'T.
- Never sit in front of a textbook or set book just reading. Have a pencil and paper in front of you always and make notes – even if it is just the main point of each paragraph.
