We have just had our annual open evening and it was good to see so many people brave the cold night. We tried something new this year - had the tours of the school first so people could be assured of a guide and get to all the interesting places. People seemed to like that. Certainly staff seemed happy with the steady stream of people asking interested questions and making supportive comments. Many seem amazed at the wonderful resources we have in the school. In my talk I concentrated on the way we are modernising our teaching, learning and reporting in the junior school and people are certainly interested. In fact people across the country are interested.

Earlier in the term I was asked to talk to Auckland secondary deputy principals and last week I was talking to the Otago/Southland deputy principals about our Tukutahi style of teaching the juniors and the PLOs. We are beginning a new movement. I spent an interesting day in Southland Girls and found the way they are melding their Yr 7 – Yr10s very interesting. It is a wonderful time to be in education if one is not ground down by the constant nagging about raising student achievement when they really mean get better exam marks not send confident, connected, life-long learners off their futures.

PLOs are something many of the DPs I was talking to were very interested in implementing, as we have, to show parents how we are developing students' key competencies. It was great to be able to share the positive comments we had had from parents which included:

- "I see the PLO as 'bringing everything together' and is a positive one on one experience for the student."
- "...the conversation we had while formulating the goals was VERY valuable and an insight for all of us on how my son thinks."
- "...Wellington High School is a scary choice for some parents, but I knew that it would be an environment where children can thrive and enjoy learning. I am very happy."
- "...I was impressed by the efforts to target individual needs and to communicate with parents. I was expecting this to decline at high school"
- "...my son and I found the session useful; he because had the chance to reflect on his learning habits and to improve them, me because I could see what he thought about his own learning skills and where he was at in developing good learning habits."

I hope you all found it easy to go to the school website and give us your feedback. Thank you everyone who did. 88% of respondents found the PLO experience useful or very useful. I hope to that you also took the opportunity to log into your student's My Portfolio and write up their first set of learning goals. I am sure you will all look back at them at the end of Yr 13 and smile at your thinking then.

Have a corker holiday with your corker kids. I am off to London and Paris with the Food and Fashion trip.

## **Year 11 – 13 Reports and Reporting Evenings**

With this newsletter will be end of term reports for Yr11-13 students. This information will give a full set of data to discuss with your student and plan a holiday study programme with them. #### **Attendance printouts**

Printouts tell you if you student was present (P) and this is the important data. Justified (J) absences, Overseas trips (O) and Unjustified (U) absences are all absences and should be avoided – if they are not in class they will not be learning for NCEA. Unjustified absences should be discussed and may indicate truancy.

Everyone in every class every day remains our mantra.

### Wellington High School May Lose Night Classes!

Buried in the recent Government Budget was an announcement which will effectively spell the end to night classes in schools throughout the country.

The Government is cutting 80% of the funding given to 212 schools in New Zealand to run their ACE (Adult Community Education) programmes in the weekends and evenings. The remaining 20% will have to be re-directed to literacy and numeracy and foundation learning but this money will only be available to a small number of schools, who are yet to be identified.

The removal of this funding will mean the end of a one-hundred-year old tradition in New Zealand of offering night classes to local communities and the loss of the opportunity to engage in lifelong learning for more than 200,000 learners nation-wide - 6000 of whom enrol each year here at Wellington High School, which has had adults in classes at night since the 1880s!

The Government's stated reason for cutting the funding is that, in times of recession, people should pay for their own "hobbies". Adult education is so much more than that – in a time of recession, the country should be investing more in education for all, not reducing the funding.

Adults come to learn for all sorts of reasons: some come to gain more skills in computing and business studies to get jobs, others to learn essential life skills such as budgeting, defensive driving and First Aid. Many ACE programmes offer affordable ESOL courses for new migrants and refugees - courses that are not available or affordable elsewhere.

Many other students come to meet new people, gain new skills and end social isolation - potentially saving costs for other Government agencies like Health and Social Development. ACE has fantastic benefits for the community yet the total funding is just \$16 million, out of a total tertiary budget of \$2.6 billion (less than 0.6%).

A nation-wide petition, a postcard protest to Parliament, an email campaign and a range of locally-driven initiatives are already underway - we really need the support of our school community to convince the Government to reverse the cuts and re-instate the funding.

You will notice that there is a small card contained with MANA TOHU MATAURANGA O ACTEARDA your student's report. This has instructions on how to log on to the NZQA site so that students can keep up to date with how they are progressing with NCEA. Please encourage your student to follow the instructions on the card and keep track of their credits for the rest of the year.

The NZQA records are updated as often as we upload a file to the NZQA site – this is usually done at the beginning and middle of the month. It is a manual process so sometimes the NZQA records will not be up-to-date.

#### **Fees**

You have now been invoiced for fees for this year's NCEA. Please note that the payment is for all internally assessed and externally assessed standards. If your child is only doing internally assessed standards you still need to pay their NCEA fee to have those credits registered with NZQA.

If you wish to apply for financial assistance, this can be done through student services. All fees need to be paid by Friday August 28. Late payment will incur a \$50 late fee.

#### Have you visited the NZQA web-site yet?

The NZQA site contains a wealth of information related to NCEA including past papers. If you go to <a href="http://www.nzqa.govt.nz/ncea/index.html">http://www.nzqa.govt.nz/ncea/index.html</a> there is a search engine you can use to find information on unit standards and achievement standards. This is especially useful for externally assessed standards (exams your child will do at the end of the year). Type in the standard number and you will be presented with information on the achievement standard, past papers and reports which include solutions and marking criteria.

Talk to your child, find out what standards they are sitting at the end of the year (they have all been given course outlines at the beginning of the year) and encourage them to access this site. If getting this information is difficult, the external standards they are entered for will be shown on the mid year report that accompanies this newsletter. Students who set themselves up for success regularly access this type of material and work through past papers so that they are well prepared for the final examination.

#### NEWS FROM THE SCIENCE FACULTY

## **Zealandia** (Year 10 Science Enrichment Programme)

Thirty talented year 10 scientists visited Zealandia (formerly the Karori Wildlife Sanctuary) on a cold but bright morning on May 21st. Their mission was to investigate the methods used to eradicate possums and other introduced pests from the sanctuary. Experiences like this are opportunities to put academic learning in Science into relevant and local context. The group were shown a large array of traps, baits, poisons and of course the famous fence. Each was carefully analysed in terms of its effectiveness at controlling pests and limiting the by-catch of native birds and domestic animals. The kids took copious notes and photos and kept Tom Lynch - Zealandia's educator - busy with questions.

The group then invited Associate Professor Doug Eckery from Victoria University to give a seminar at High about his research into biological control of possums. This was an opportunity for the students to interact with a genuine expert tutor working on state of the art research. Again pens moved furiously over notepaper as they learnt that substances are being trialled that can make possums infertile. There is potential for this method to control possums in a more humane way, with no impact on non-target species, at low cost, and maybe even passed from possum to possum. Professor Eckery described the possum life cycle with the aid of plastinated possum foetuses and an enthralling slideshow. Throughout the session the group were engaged and inquisitive, with the more vocal students willing to debate the finer points. They demonstrated a developing interest in Biology and biological control as well as the ability to apply their existing knowledge in science.

#### **Year 13 Sculpture Class**

Last Thursday a group of sculpture students took the opportunity to take part in a work-shop run by well known Auckland artist Judy Darragh The students were able to work alongside this much admired artist and create a piece of sculpture based around Darragh's work that has been exhibited. The students made trophies out of recycled materials and then awarded the trophies to each other. It was great fun and a great experience working with a contemporary practising artist.



#### YOUND PEOPLE AND DRUGS

## **Prevention Tips for Parents**

There is no sure-fire way to drug proof your children. The tips below might help you focus on some important things that may help:

#### Role Modelling

As a parent you have a huge influence on the behaviour of your children. Be aware of your influence as a role-model. How do you use alcohol? Do you smoke? Children learn from the adults around them. What have they learnt from you?

#### Knowledge

Most people are not well informed about drugs. This is particularly true of parents. You should aim to learn as much as you can about the subject. This will make it easier to talk about drugs with your children.

#### **Teachable Moments**

Talk to your children about drugs from a early age. Don't make a big deal about it though. The best approach is to let the topic come up 'naturally'. Wait for a relevant television item, newspaper article or a discussion about a movie and bring up the subject of drugs then. By giving your children accurate information about drugs throughout their life they will be in a better position to make sound, informed decisions. If your family offers strong values and support, your children may not see drug use as a attractive option.

#### Communication

Good communication is vital. It must be honest, regular and open. Listen carefully to your children's opinions, and try not to be judgemental. Avoid lecturing. This advice applies to other issues besides drugs.

#### Positive Environment

Show you love your children by spending time with them and by making them feel valued. Let them know your are proud of them and do this often. Children with a high self-esteem find it easier to resist pressure to use drugs.

#### Parent Networks

Get to know the parents of the friends of your children and agree on guidelines and boundaries with them. Be one step ahead of the game.


