#### Nga Korero o te tumuaki

We have just completed a wonderful day of reflection and future gazing while your students learned at home – I hope.

The New Zealand secondary education system is at an interesting stage of development and in my mind there is little doubt some of the things we do have to change. I think the most interesting thing is that despite great changes being made to the national examination system and the advent of NCEA with its flexibility and wider recognition of achievement reinforced now by endorsed certificates and subjects everything the traditionalists wanted - 42% of students across the nation leave with less than Level 2 qualifications. That, to me is clear signal that things are not as they should be. When I look at our results they are better than that but we can still improve.

Greater minds than mine have come up with alternative approaches which are encapsulated in the new New Zealand curriculum and here at High we are in agreement that education is not about stuffing knowledge - finished, know-that knowledge - into children's heads. about building students' capacity to learn building their dispositions competencies to keep on learning beyond these walls. It is about building on their interests and providing opportunities that will enable them to succeed in whatever system is used to assess their abilities.

Our challenge is to modernise our pedagogy – our teaching techniques and philosophy - and mesh that with the NCEA assessment regime which adopts a fairly traditional interpretation of what knowledge is. We have made a start with a more student-centred approach this year in Tukutahi with the staff involved beginning to adopt an inquiry approach to student

learning. They are using the ecology of a stream near the school as the basis of their studies. We are looking at spreading this model through Year 9 next year as we further develop personalised learning. Personalising learning is not everyone having a traditional IEP. It is about students knowing what they know, how they know it and what they need to learn next. We have a great group of teachers who have been working on this method of personalising learning through shared expectations - learning outcomes and enabling students to understand what they have to do reach expectations and the next level. These are interesting times of change.

One thing that never changes is WHS success with Shakespeare and his plays. If you saw the Shakespeare Society's Pericles last week you will understand what I mean. They made a great job of a very challenging play. From there most of them returned to Julius Caesar and the Sheila Winn national festival (competition). You remember they won several awards in the regional festival. Well on Sunday they won again. connection with the audience and at the adjudication the judges acknowledged WHS's Julius Caesar as one of, if not the best performance in the festival. Jack Buchanan won one of five special individual awards. Well done all of you and a big thank you to past WHS Shakespeareans Max Hardy and Ailsa Krefft for their direction. Shakespeare society has been going for 17 years now and it is a fabulous example of what students can do.

Another high performing cultural group Kapa Haka is off to the nationals next week. They have consistently been in the top two in the Wellington competition and we wish them well on the national stage. Kia Kaha!

#### When is payment due?


Payment is due at school by **Friday 29 August**. There are a number of methods available for the payment of these fees: cash, cheque, EFPOS, credit card or an automatic payment can be set up. For credit card or AP payments contact the Accounts department. If you do not pay your fees, NZQA will not report any results on your Record of Learning and you will not get any certificates. Late payment will incur a \$50 late fee as well.

#### **WHS FRENCH TRIP 2008**

When you get out of the Metro at Trocadero to look down at the base of the Eiffel Tower ahead of you, and its girders soaring above you, you know you're in Paris! Eighteen students with four staff from WHS and St Pat's found this on the first day of their trip in April/May. Springtime in Paris is a cliché for a wonderful time, and this was no exception.

The expected and the surprising were mixed on the trip – we went to see Mona

Lisa at the Louvre, then were amazed on our trip to the Chateau d'Amboise to find ourselves



standing next to Leonardo da Vinci's grave!

Anzac services provided a highlight also. We went to Le Quesnoy, a small, ancient, town liberated with little damage

by the Wellington Regiment in 1917, and which still celebrates this every year. As we walked into the town, the church bells were playing "God Defend New Zealand" – a moving moment. We attended and took part in services there and at the NZ Memorial in Longuevalles, where some of our students laid wreaths with the NZ embassy and military staff, and Zoe Lahood laid the village wreath on behalf of the mayor. There are many war grave sites in the region, just little fields within farms, and we visited Caterpillar Valley, the original burial place of NZ's Unknown Warrior.

In the south of France, students stayed with families in Nice for a few days, which had great benefits for their French and, although a bit scary at times, gave them a real insight into French lifestyles.

Expeditions in the south included a trip to Menton, where the current NZ writer-in-residence at the Katherine Mansfield villa, Damien Wilkins, welcomed us for a visit. We also had a tour of the Mairie in Menton with its amazing wedding room painted by Jean Cocteau. Swimming in the Mediterranean was enjoyed by most and our tans were noticed on our return to wintry Wellington!

This was the second combined France trip for our two schools, and the students were so great that we have already started planning for 2010! Start saving now, French students, for a great time ahead.

#### **REVIEW – WHS SHAKESPEARE SOCIETY**

#### Pericles - Prince of Tyre

Where there's a Will there's a way

The Shakespeare Society pulled off another coup with its witty romp through *Pericles*. Incest, prostitution, shipwrecks, priestesses of Diana – this is Shakespearean action at its scandalous best. In their fast-paced production, directors Genevieve Krefft and Imogen Zino emphasised clarity and humour. Physical humour, slapstick, music, dance, song – they used a whole slew of theatrical devices and their talented and numerous cast performed superbly.

From the moment we were led in, the candlelight created a mystical, magical mood. The set, designed by Callum Robertson, Tom Leslie and Stuart Neville, brilliantly used the different levels of the stage. The talented costume team created character through clothing and added to the clarity. Lighting was excellent, especially in lighting up the sails in the shipwreck scenes.

Jack Buchanan's Pericles brought pathos and believability to a tricky role, and he was especially effective in his quiet scenes. Michael Boyes and Anna Harcourt handled their incestuous roles creepily well. Meg Thompson was a

crass, dangerous Simonides, Sasha Tilly displayed serious stillness as Cerimon, Anthony Young was a gorgeously hypocritical Governor, Liffey Jacobson-Wright vividly played Marina as a protester as well as a victim, and Tai Berdinner-Blades provided a repellently haughty and show-stopping Dionyza. Intelligent interpretations by Zachary Kerr's Gower and Freya Dean's Helicanus helped clarify the action.

The comic set-pieces (the fishermen, the knights, the pirates) were highly entertaining and these actors can be delighted with their performances. It was also a pleasure to see so many younger students in the cast; a guarantee, surely, that such high-level productions will continue.

These annual Shakespeare Society productions are a tribute to the dedication and hard work of our Wellington High School students, and a constant reminder of what can be achieved by motivated, committed students.





#### **The Project**
