


Recreation Boxes On

Attendance Printouts

Printouts tell you if you student was present (P) and this is the important data. Justified (J) absences, Overseas trips (O) and Unjustified (U) absences are all absences and should be avoided – if they are not in class they are hindering their learning and their ability to succeed in their chosen courses. Unjustified absences should be discussed and may indicate truancy.

Maximising attendance will help maximise achievement!

Parent Portal

There is a direct link to this on the new Wellington High School web site (http://www.whs.school.nz) under the Whānau menu. The portal gives you access to some of the information we have on our system: daily notices, student details and timetable, student attendance, NCEA summary, assessment results, extra curricular groups, reports, pastoral items, awards, fees and Fees with Flo2Cash (there is a secure facility where you can pay all or part of your fees), Careers (containing a record of your learning conversation interview in the 'Interviews' section, course selection (this will be needed later in the year for Y9-12 students). Usernames and passwords were sent home and emailed in term 1. If you would like to gain access to the portal, email helpdesk@whs.school.nz with your name and your student's name.


Absences – You can notify the school about any absences by either phoning 385 8911 and pressing 2 to get the Absence Line or emailing absences@whs.school.nz
