PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE

Kia ora koutou, nga mihi nui koutou katoa. Greetings to you all

You will be aware that in the last week Anne Grimmer, our Careers Counsellor, passed away after a short illness. Anne arrived at Wellington High School in June 2002 to take up the role of careers advisor. She was responsible for creating and developing employment studies courses and overseeing the transition of literally thousands of students to the workplace or further training.

Anne had a wonderful presence in our staff room enlivening any room with her smile and laughter. She was a highly valued, welf-respected colleague. She will be greatly missed.

The school was well represented at her funeral as staff and students paid tribute to her enormous input into the career planning of many students, and to show their support to her family. As a school community we offer our condolences to her partner, her daughters and her many friends.

Learning Conversations have become an integral part of our connection with families. The ability to have a conversation focussing on each student's goals and targets is very valuable. I thank all families for their attendance at these important meetings. The feedback I receive about them is always positive and it is recognised how relationships are built by these connections.

As a school we put a lot of effort into promoting the need for good attendance patterns, and I know that many families check the portal to be assured that their young person is at school. In this regard, I need to comment about the coding of absences so that any misunderstanding can be avoided.

We are bound by Ministry of Education guidelines in the coding of absences. The Ministry provides schools with 24 categories to code student absences. Following these protocols justified absences are those where a young person is "required" to be away from school. These absences may include family observances like funerals, or representative sports fixtures where the young person needs to be away from school.

Explained absences are those where a family "chooses" to have

their youngsters from school, like holidays or overseas travel. These may be deemed to be at the family's discretion rather than a requirement. While the school might see value in such opportunities we are unable to justify them as absences.

I know students and staff are all ready to have a break. I wish everyone a safe and relaxing holiday and look forward to the challenges of Term 2.



international finals in Thailand at the end of $\mbox{\it June}.$


