AUTOMATIC ATTENDANCE ALERT

You and your student have heard a great deal from Wellington High lately regarding attendance and the strong relationship between academic achievement and being in class. Our goal is to work in partnership with you to ensure that your student has the best possible access to learning achievement.

To this end, we have a fantastic automatic text system which means that you'll get a text if your student is marked absent without explanation for a period or longer. This system is highly accurate and can be trusted- if you get a text you can safely assume that your student is not in class.

If there is a valid reason for your student missing a class e.g. as a result of illness or a doctor's appointment, we need to hear from you as soon as possible, either via email or a note. For any absence as a result of illness that lasts for more than three days we require a doctor's certificate. Family holidays should be arranged during school holidays. In exceptional circumstances, families wishing to remove their student from school during term time for trips or holidays, must apply to the Principal for leave. Interestingly, the Ministry of Education categories this type of absence as "explained but unjustified".

AROTAHI SCIENCE

Arotahi science carried out some of the winter pruning operation on Anaroa Hills Vineyard in July.

Rowan Hoskins from vine managers showed the students how to prune correctly. The conditions were wet and cold, and we could not complete the operation on the day.

This important operation for the 2015 harvest was completed by Kirsty, Ross, a neighbour and Max Smith.

The purpose of the authentic learning was to prune out the dead wood, train the canes,



and to control the growth and vigour. The aim is to have good quality grapes ripening together at the end of summer.

HIGH ACHIEVING JUNIOR SCIENTISTS

The ICAS suite of tests is developed by the University of New South Wales and evaluates students' skills, knowledge and understanding in the core learning areas. The tests are sat by students throughout Australia, New Zealand and Asia.

Fifty-three Year 9 and 10 students sat the science ICAS this year. We are proud of the 27 Credit winners and 18 students gained a very impressive distinction award, more than we have ever had before. Well done to Daisy Abraham, Cassandra Bahr, Liam Beaumont, Rohan Jackson, Gilda Knox Streader, Callum Davidson, Lauren Jack, Rose Mackenzie, Joseph Sutton, Hazel Williams and Romy Tennent for gaining distinction in the year 10 test.

This year we also gained a high distinction award reserved for the top 1% of all candidates. Matthew Dench in year 9 can be justifiably proud of a stellar performance.

BIOLOGY

WHS Biology staff and students joined a host of excellent presenters showcasing women's research in genetics from Otago University at the National Library. Our students were keen to learn more about NZ women working at the cutting edge of Genetics research.

They discovered how we are using DNA to track human migrations and population origins, the difficulty in predicting heart disease and how we are using zebrafish help understand human disease. They were most intrigued by Dr Stephanie Hughes' talk titled "Don't forget to put out the rubbish: lessons from genetic mutations in the cellular recycling" system.




and other credits which took into account social responsibility-critical to success in a country where the culture is quite different to home.
