Junior PE



Ruairi Cahill-Fleury being tested

With the Junior PE Enrichment programme, we have been looking at how we test for predicted maximum oxygen consumption (VO2 max) via the much hated “beep test”. To demonstrate what VO2 max really was, the group visited Bodylab where Ruairi Cahill-Fleury volunteered to have a true VO2 max gas analysis test. This required Ruairi to run on a treadmill at progressively faster speeds until exhaustion, while a computer analysed the oxygen and carbon dioxide he inhaled and exhaled. Ruairi scored exceptionally well, measuring **72.82 ml/kg/min**. To put that in perspective, 35 ml/kg/min is the norm for a sedentary male, 60 ml/kg/min is considered excellent for an 18 year old male and top cyclists have measured between 66–76 ml/kg/min. Ruairi should be very happy with his result!

Fashion Students Travelling to Europe in 2013!




Imagine:
