The school has recently introduced a new use for Google calendars, where teachers invite students to participate in assessments. This is so that students, by accepting the invitation, create their own personalised assessment calendar that we hope they will share with you so that you are aware of their learning commitments.

I guess that this brings us to the key message. I believe that success at school is a three way partnership, with the students, their parents and the school itself all contributing equally to the achievement of every individual. When all three are working together we see real success. When one of the three elements provides weaker input, the three-way dynamic is made weaker so success is harder to achieve. Let's work together!
