

CONGRATULATIONS



The seven CORE Education eFellowship Awards winners for 2014 were announced on 10 October 2013 at the ULearn13 conference held in Hamilton. Ben Britton, teacher of Mathematics and Computing at Wellington High School,

was amongst those named.

As a very passionate early adopter, he was involved in the 1:1 computers pilot programme at Wellington High and has been teaching in a 1:1 environment for four years now

During this time he has adapted his teaching approach as the types of devices students bring has changed.

Two years ago, he built a kitset 3D printer to explore how it might be possible to use it in school. Now he has introduced this technology to Wellington High, and he has been continually amazed at what students are capable of creating with them. He believes that 3D printers will make a huge impact on the world that our students are growing up in.

ANAROA HILLS GRAPEVINE UPDATE

Kirsty and Ross Fergusson are carrying out the scheduled sulphur spray operations to protect the vines from pests and disease. The vines are looking very healthy. Vineyard consultant Rowan Hoskins from Vine Managers delivered some new vines to blank the few missing vines and give advice. Kirsty is currently carrying out a head thinning operation. The first authentic learning opportunities for students in early 2014 will be a pre bunch closure sulfur spray, leaf plucking and fruit

INCOMING YEAR 9 STUDENTS - BYOT

BYOT stands for Bring Your Own Technology and digital technology is an integral tool for learning at Wellington High School. Students use tablets, netbooks or laptops as an electronic text book and exercise book, as an information portal, for software and application use, to collaborate with others and to develop critical internet literacy.

We expect that all students will have a device when they start at the beginning of 2014. If you have not been able to secure a device there are a range of options available at www.cyclone.co.nz that could be used for a Year 9 student . Our preferred option is the Samsung Chromebook (retailing at about \$450). These are a relatively new product that look like a netbook but operate similar to a tablet. They are essentially a computer built on a web browser meaning apps (via the chrome store) are installed to the Chromebook but software installation (such as iTunes) is not possible. Like a tablet they have a small hard drive (16Gb) but students will be allocated their own Google account at WHS and will store their work 'in the clouds'. They are light, cheap (by computer and tablet standards) and will perform all the functions required at junior level. If you wish to know more about this product, simply search 'Samsung Chromebook reviews'. If a student wishes to store large amounts of video, photos and music on their device, they should look at other options.

If you wish to purchase a product that your student could use all the way through high school you may opt for an Ultrabook or Macbook. These obviously have their merits and will run the more sophisticated industry software that students will be exposed to in specialist areas in senior years. However, a lot changes in a short time in this area.

If you are still confused by all the technology that's out there, don't hesitate to contact us and we will be able to help you with your decision making.
